



What Did I Learn?

• That community dwelling women age 85 and older face a variety of challenges

• That their transportation and education needs are not being met

 That researchers can be ageist, biased and have preconceived notions

How Can We Provide Support?

• Raise awareness:

- >only have one kick at the can
- >understand the importance of both the needs and wants being met
- right limitate barriers (ageism, marginalization, social justice)
- > focus on abilities
- provide critical education to unsettle older people's complacency about their social conditions and their powerlessness to transform society

Transportation

- Transportation options can be critical to the ability of older adults to get where they need to go, especially when they have limited their driving or have stopped driving altogether.
 - ➤ Availability
 - ➤ Acceptability
 - > Accessibility
 - ➤ Adaptability
 - **≻**Affordability


Consequences of Inaction


